
Fife Chat on Sunday 1/19/2025 6:30 p. m. Eastern

Thank you Raquel King and William Jones for your contributions to IFFCA – past and present!

IFFCA has been promoting and building the presence of the Fife Fancy Canary in the United States and Canada for decades.

We thank **Raquel King**, who has provided invaluable help establishing the history of IFFCA, submitting details of the early years, as well as several documents of memorabilia.

William Jones and Clarence King were the first to initiate the club. Jones, with Clarence and Raquel King were among the first to import Fife from England in 1982. Raquel included a letter from the IFFCA in England acknowledging the Exchange of Fife Fancy rosettes from America in 1983, *see below*.

At the 1983 National show held in Denver, Colorado, Bill Jones name was listed in the Booster sponsor in show catalog. Clarence & Raquel won 2nd and 3rd place in the Fife Section, which was among the Division 2 Type Canaries.

Robert and Pattye Roberts served as president and secretary during 1990's when IFFCA members earned a separate Division for the Fife Fancy Canary. *See IFFCA ad in that year's NBS show catalog on page 8 of this newsletter.*

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
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Selecting Fife Canaries to Keep

Rule Number One



When sorting out canaries to retain: keep the flighted birds which have produced the best youngsters. Although with good line breeding management these should be your best birds anyway.

Having done that, I place all my clear yellow cocks in training cages and choose the best two or three for retaining, remembering always to check on their parentage. If in doubt choose ones from the flighted birds you are to retain because they will probably produce the best youngsters, just as their parents have already done so.

With the Fife the starting point for its "type" is the small overall round shape which is required. Wherever you look at a Fife from any angle think in circles. Think round footballs and not rugby balls (soccer balls, not footballs for our transatlantic fanciers!). Rugby ball shaped canaries were fine years ago, but not today.

The first thing I do is place all the training cages on the floor. This is the easiest way of picking out the overall round birds. Discard any flat sided ones – they're of no use to you in the breeding room or on the show bench. Although, from sideways on in a show cage this fault is not as easily identified. Fifes are exhibited in all wire cages so judges can (or should!) look at the bird front-ways on, instead of putting them on the floor to see this roundness, which at a show is rather unrealistic.

<u>Rule Number Two</u>

Pick out for further scrutiny the Fifes whose width across the shoulder is two fifths their overall length.

This is easier to achieve in the hens, particularly the yellows, but it's something to aim for in order to achieve that lovely round shape we desire in all our birds.

Once the training cages have been placed back on the training bench look for the Fifes who have a lovely round back. Look for an excess of back if necessary, because on the show bench a lack of back will disappear when "worked" by a judge. Conversely, you don't want too much curve on the front, and the line from the beak to the under-carriage should be a continuous line downwards – not a boat shape! That grand old fancier, the late Jim Feather, used to say to me "look for as much on the back as you have on the front". Today you want more emphasis.

The head too should be as round as possible although in such a small bird this is easier to achieve in the buffs. The final area and possibly most important in this overall assessment of roundness is that positive break between the back of the head and the start of the curve on the back.

<u>SIZE</u>

A lot has been written and spoken about regarding the size of the Fife. Much of which would have been better unsaid. In theory, the aim of the Fife breeder is to have show birds no longer than four and a quarter inches long.

Many of the top fanciers prefer larger cocks (particularly buffs) when it comes to breeding provided they have the type and quality. Big typey buff cock birds produce quality small yellow hens. So if in doubt, choose a

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slightly larger cock bird for breeding providing it excels in all other areas

When I'm selecting my Fifes to retain I'm conscious of some of the inflexible attitudes to size, especially in Fifes. We all want small birds, as no-one will go far with big birds, but type must be the top criteria when choosing for showing and/or breeding. Occasionally they can be mutually exclusive.

WINGS AND TAIL

Poor wings ruin a good bird whatever the breed.

What you want to see is as little as possible of the wings, because they don't fit in with the overall roundness concept. They also complement the round arching back – if Fifes only have a round back, which doesn't reach the rump, then the wings will be prominent and show too much; if the rounded back is complete and full then the wings should only show their tips. We'll then have the overall round shape we're looking for.

Similarly a poor tail ruins a good Fife.

A broad tail detracts from the width of the shoulders and makes them look narrow. It also makes the fork in the tail far too large. Like any other fault, birds with this fault should be discarded - although it is possible to work on a bad tail if the bird has other exhibition qualities.

Occasionally a bird will pop up with one bad wing, and I had such a case a couple of years ago. The wing was dropped but it was otherwise a first class Fife bred from good parents. Its siblings showed no such fault. As a consequence I retained it, as without this fault it would have been a good show bird. All its youngsters had perfect wings. As with all faults, if they are minor they can be bred out. So always look at the breeding potential of any bird before making a decision, particularly if the bird's siblings don't have the fault.

COLOUR

By this I mean the depth and quality of colour, particularly in the clear line.

In clears you should be looking for that beautiful deep buttercup yellow, particularly in the yellow cocks but even the buff hens should have a background of buttercup yellow. Once a line has been established of clear and lightly variegated Fifes then it should be easy to tell the cocks from the hens in both yellows and buffs. This is because the cocks will have the deeper colour, as well as being slightly longer and not quite as round. You cannot apply this rule when judging at a show, as different fanciers have different quality of colour. It's not easy to spot the cocks in hen classes, although a poor coloured Fife in a clear cock class will either be a hen, or should be marked down for colour in any case.

STEADINESS

This can still be a problem with Fifes.

They are more active than most other breeds of canaries and are more likely to fluster when worked by a judge. The active nature of the Fife is one reason why a good show bird needs some extra roundness on the back as the back will soon go if worked by a judge.

Some Fifes have a calmer temperament and I find the hens to be that little bit steadier.

A few Fifes don't take to a show cage, but these are getting fewer, so treat any wildness as a fault when considering which Fifes to retain.

QUALITY

Some Fifes, or other breed of canary, have an overall quality which goes beyond the other strengths I've listed. It could be the feather quality, the sheen on the plumage, the movement, or more likely the position of the legs when on the perch. Whatever it is, it's obvious in some canaries and should be considered when making your final selection of birds, particularly if it's siblings have the same strengths.


International Fife Fancy Club of America NBS 2024


